Beauty Spot Awareness

Edinburgh is a beautiful, scenic place to live and there are lots of well-known beauty spots to visit and enjoy. Many of these areas have parking facilities and unfortunately thieves have been taking advantage of this lately. In a number of cases, victims have arrived, parked their cars, placed valuables in the boot and on returning found that their car has been broken into while neighbouring cars with no valuables in the boot remain untouched. This would indicate that thieves may be observing from nearby and targeting only vehicles that are worth their while.

To reduce the chances of falling victim to this type of crime, we advise that you make sure you lock and secure your car whenever you leave it and don't leave valuables on display. Car thieves often steal first and think about value later. Take your valuables with you or lock them in the boot prior to arriving at the destination where you intend to park up. Don't be tempted to hide things under the seats or leave them in the glove box.

Satellite Navigation systems are also highly sought after and we have found that some criminals are looking for the sucker mark that is left on the inside of your windscreen by the handset, then breaking in on the off chance that you've hidden the goods somewhere in the car. CRIMES AGAINST PREMISES

Here are details of premises broken into or where there were attempts made to break into them. They are as follows:

- Pentland View Court by prising the rear secure shutters.
- Currievale Park.

REMEMBER

Make the home look occupied. Thieves do not want to be seen or disturbed. Convincing them that someone is at home is undoubtedly the best deterrent.

Make sure that you lock all outside doors and windows and if you have an alarm make sure it is set (even if you only pop out for a few minutes).

Use automatic timer switches to turn your lights on when it goes dark. Don't just have the hall light switched on when you're not in. Have the lights switching themselves on in the bedroom, kitchen and lounge (if you're worried about the environment, consider using low wattage bulbs).

A plug in timer for the radio would make it sound as if someone was at home. Tune the radio to a station that has more talking than music.

CRIMES AGAINST THE PERSON

INCIDENTS REPORTED TO THE POLICE

During the month there were 120 incidents logged by the police in respect of your ward. Of these 6 were Graded 1, i.e. emergencies, 39 Graded 2 i.e. non-emergencies but should be responded to within one hour. 43 were graded 3, 11 graded 4 and 21 were graded 5 and didn't require police attendance.

OTHER CRIMES

On the 4th a couple of crimes were reported at Currie High where mobile phones were stolen from changing areas.

SOLVED CRIMES

A 15 year old male has been charged with Robbery & Assault following an incident in Baberton Avenue

VEHICLE CRIME

Between the 22nd and the 24th, a motor cycle was damaged and items stolen from it whilst parked in Dolphin Road.



At 0530hrs on the 19th, a car was entered by a male who was disturbed by the car owner. The male ran off towards fields and made good his escape. He is described as being 20 – 30 and wearing a beanie hat.

Between the 18th and the 19th, an insecure car was entered whilst parked in Foulis Crescent and items stolen.

On the morning of the 18th, a car parked in Baberton Avenue was entered by smashing the window. An ipod connector cable was stolen.

Again on the morning of the 18th, an insecure car was entered in Lanark Road and a bag with personal effects was stolen.

Between the 12th and the 13th, in Belmont Road, a car was entered by smashing a window however nothing appears to have been stolen.

If you follow the following advice we can help to reduce the risk of car crime in our area!

- Fit an electronic engine immobiliser
 - Get an alarm fitted
 - Fit a steering wheel lock
 - When at home, keep your car keys out of view in a safe place. Place them in a drawer away from doors, windows or the letterbox
- Do not leave anything in your car that may tempt thieves. Especially Sat-Nav systems & CD/MP3 radio players.
