Before You Start Drinking, Get Thinking

December is traditionally a time for nights out to celebrate the end of a hard year and many of those attending will drink more alcohol than they would normally.

Top Tips For A Safe Night Out

1. **Don’t drink and drive.** Even small amounts of alcohol adversely affect reaction times. You could be arrested and lose your driving license or worse **you could lose your life or be responsible for the death of someone else.**
2. **Know how you are getting home.** Know where and when the night buses leave or arrange to get picked up from somewhere central and safe. Have a reliable taxi number in your mobile as Private Hire cars are not allowed to pick up passengers who have not pre-booked. Never be tempted to get into a car you have not pre booked as you don’t know what you are getting into.
3. **Don’t accept drinks from strangers** and never leave your drink unattended - it’s easy for someone to put something in it.
4. **Alcohol can make you lose your inhibitions,** make you feel attractive and funny but when you’re drunk you are also at your most vulnerable. You could become a target for violence and unwanted attention, so **drink responsibly.**
5. **Look after your property.** Don’t leave your bag over the back of your chair and keep wallets and purses close to your body to make it more difficult for thieves. Be alert to sneak thieves in pubs, clubs and restaurant.
6. **Don’t get into petty arguments** in the pub or on the street – being drunk often makes people more aggressive than usual and arguments can lead to violence.

INCIDENT SUMMARY

During the month of November there was a reduced number of reported incidents from last month, down to 111.

Of these 3 were graded 1 – emergencies, 30 were graded 2 – non emergencies but still to be attended to within 1 hour, 43 were graded 3, 13 were graded 4 and 22 were graded 5 – no police attendance required.

VANDALISM

There were vehicles damaged during the month of November in Baberton Crescent, Nether Currie Road, and Muirwood Road also Heriot Watt University. A rear kitchen window was also smashed at Curriehill Castle Drive

CRIMES AGAINST PREMISES

There was only one report of housebreaking in November to a portacabin at Baberton Avenue. They entered this by smashing the skylight on the roof. 4 boys were dealt with in relation to this incident.



AUTOCRIME

A scooter was stolen from Currievale Drive overnight on the evening of 3rd November. Enquiries were carried out with a negative result. Unfortunately the bike was found later burnt out at Currie Station.

A motorbike was stolen from the back garden of 11 Palmer Road overnight on 2nd November. Enquiries are still ongoing with regards to this.

A silver Ford Fiesta was stolen from outside a property on Lanark Road West. This happened overnight on the 9th November. Enquiries are still ongoing.

SHOPLIFTING

Two males stole a bottle of whisky from Threshers at Lanark Road West about 6pm on Saturday 14th November, they made off and boarded a 44 first bus heading into Edinburgh. One male is described as 40+ maybe drunk with a blotchy face, the other about 30+ wearing a blue wooly hat. One was carrying either a rucksack or trolleybag.
